

## Fallings Park Primary PE and Sport Premium 2024/25



## Key achievements to date until July 2025:

- PE team has created consistency within school to assist PE across all 3 Key stages.
- Success in competitive sport Cricket, football and the entry of Black Country games for rugby.
- Continued increased participation to over 50% of KS2 pupils attending after school clubs – this has sustained despite school expansion.
- Providing swimming sessions for 270-year groups and nurture groups.
- Increased activity at Breakfast Club, use of MUGA.
- Developing sports leaders in year 6 to support sport in breakfast club and lunchtimes.
- Walk to School initiative supported by PE team.
- The introduction of interschool competitions which will continue to be developed.
- Wild tribe continues across the school.
- Staff deliver Wild tribe across the KS1, LKS2 and UKS2.
- Increased numbers of swimmers swimming 25m+ at the end of Key Stage Two (ongoing). 83% can swim 25m on their front.
- Increased confidence of ECTs to deliver Physical Education in school supported by PE team.
- Increase physical activity with Storm break in our curriculum.
- Awarded Platinum SG Mark.

## Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- To increase the number of swimmers swimming 25m+ at the end of Key Stage Two (ongoing).
- Increase confidence of delivery Physical Education in school.
- Increase number of children taking part in inter-school competitive sport.
- Continue adding to PE resources to allow staff to teach high quality lessons.
- Embed house competitions within school to increase profile of intraschool sport.
- Continue to develop sports leaders within school to different year groups other than Year 6 children.
- Explore further cross-curricular links between PE and other curriculum subjects.
- Whole school staff training for the re-introduction of Tagtivate.
- Continue the development of Wild tribe across the key phases.
- Sensory circuits to be completed by pupils with a sensory need across school.
- Physical activities to be linked to the zones of regulations depending on the needs of the cohort/individual child.
- PTA to develop programme of outdoor activities to involve parents and the community.
- Organisations from the community to provide sessions to encourage pupils to have a go and take part. Staffordshire Cricket Association.
