

## Fallings Park Primary PE and Sport Premium 2022/23



## Key achievements to date until July 2023: Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- A new PE team has been created within school to assist PE across all 3 Key stages.
- 4 more staff trained in 'Teacher of School Swimming' to allow for more groups at swimming in addition to the 12 we already have.
- Success in competitive sport Cricket and the entry of Black Country games for rugby.
- Gold School Games mark 18/19 21/22 22/23
- Continued increased participation to over 50% of KS2 pupils attending after school clubs this has sustained despite school expansion.
- Use of Wolverhampton Wanderers Foundation to raise profile of PESSPA in school by providing children with unique opportunities.
- Providing swimming sessions for 270 year groups
- Increased activity at Breakfast Club
- Developing sports leaders in year 6 to support sport in breakfast club and lunchtimes.
- Implementation of Walk to School initiative supported by living the streets.
- The introduction of interschool competitions from gymnastics and athletics this year which will continue to be developed.
- Wildtribe certification for the school.
- 3 more staff trained in delivering Wildtribe across the KS1, LKS2 and UKS2.

- To increase the number of swimmers swimming 25m+ at the end of Key Stage Two (ongoing).
- Increase confidence of ECTs to deliver Physical Education in school support from Wolves Foundation.
- Increase amount of children taking part in inter-school competitive sport.
- Continue adding to PE resources to allow staff to teach high quality lessons.
- Increase physical activity with the introduction of Stormbreaker to our curriculum.
- Embed house competitions within school to increase profile of intraschool sport.
- Continue to develop sports leaders within school to different year groups other than Year 6 children.
- Support from Wolves Foundation for charity events that have taken place school (KI 2).
- Work towards platinum SG Mark (5 years at gold).
- Explore further cross-curricular links between PE and other curriculum subjects.
- Whole school staff training for the re-introduction of Tagtivate.
- Continue the development of Wildtribe across the key phases.
